Dear Friends,

Remember, remember.... but not just the 5th of November. For me, the month of November epitomises remembrance. This year, as I write this letter mid-October, I do so with a heart heavy with sadness against the backdrop of the dramatic and horrific escalation in the conflict in the Middle East which has become a dreadful reality for many millions of people in Israel and Gaza over the last few days. We are all, I'm sure, wrestling with the horrors unfolding day by day which are being relayed through the media and the stark images and stories of suffering, the personal stories of loss and grief and the utter hopelessness that many feel as homes, livelihoods and loved ones are taken on both sides. Some of you, no doubt will have friends or relatives who are in some way affected. Yet again, as in the ongoing war in Ukraine, we see the dreadful human cost of war, particularly the cost to ordinary people, men, women and children caught up in a struggle not of their making.

It seems that we have learnt so little through the years, through the conflicts which we will recall again on Remembrance Sunday in two World Wars, through the wars in Bosnia, Afghanistan, Iraq, The Falklands, the conflict in Northern Ireland, Syria, and so many more....

In such dark days where is hope to be found?

In times of trouble many of us turn to God, and ask the questions that have no answers, and pray for peace. I believe that God weeps with those who weep and stays close to those who ask for his presence with them.

The Bible makes it clear that peace is not just the absence of war or being untroubled. It means being in a right relationship with God with other people and with wider society. Of course, the prophet Micah's words are looking to the end of time when God will make all things new. However, these promises also can speak to us now.

The ministry of Jesus demonstrated the kingdom or reign of God breaking into the everyday, as He healed the sick and brought reconciliation and hope. When we pray for peace, we're rejecting the 'old



order of things', of violence and war and asking God to make His kingdom real today. When we stand up for justice and refuse to participate in division we are citizens of the new kingdom, reshaping the old.

Today, and in the days to come I will continue to pray for peace in Israel, Gaza, Ukraine and beyond, across our world. I hope that you will share with me in that prayer and that, even now, nations at war will turn back to seek God's way of peace.

'Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.' Matthew 5:9

Canon Paul Hardingham continues his series on the spiritual disciplines that help us to grow and deepen our faith.

Spiritual Disciplines — Generosity

'It is more blessed to give than to receive' (Acts 20:35).

What does generosity look like for us? The practice of generosity is about more than finance, as we recognise that everything we possess belongs to God (Ps 24:1). We are stewards of all our resources, including time, possessions, gifts, as well as our love and compassion for others. God enables us to be generous, because of all that He has given us:

'You will be enriched in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God.' (2 Cor 9:11).

Here are some practical ways of practising generosity:

Give consistently: Planning our financial giving ensures that it isn't an afterthought, but carefully considered (2 Cor 9:7). We can offer time to volunteer in church or in the wider community. We might open our home to others for a meal or coffee.

Give spontaneously: God often brings opportunities across our path where we can respond spontaneously. This might be prompted by a text from a friend in crisis or giving a neighbour a helping hand. Acting spontaneously reminds us that God is always working in and through us.

Give sacrificially: Being generous also involves making sacrifices with our time and priorities, as we help others, share our possessions, or use our gifts. How can we simplify our busy lives, in order to free up

space to practise more life transforming generosity?

To engage in generosity is an invitation to experience more of God's provision in our lives:

'Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you' (Luke 6:38).

Forest Church - beside the still waters of Sale.

"He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside the still waters, he restores my soul." Psalm 23: 2

Have you ever contemplated the moon and stars and thought about God's light? Have you ever felt the wind and thunder of a storm and thought about God's power? Have you ever dwelt in God's presence in a garden?

The Psalmist did the first of these, the disciples did the second, and Jesus himself did the third.

Since I came to St Paul's in February this year folks have asked me what Forest Church is and I would say that it is all the above and a bit more too. Forest Church is All Age Worship: we acknowledge God as Creator of the Universe, and we meet to encounter and praise God. Sometimes in our busy lives there is no time to stop and enjoy creation. We forget to notice the beauty of trees, the delight of plants, the discovery of strange and fascinating insects, and geese on the canal banks.

Forest Church is an opportunity to think about our protection of God's creation. Living Christ – filled lives in this century means living lives of Creation Care.

Much of the message of the scriptures draws on the natural world in which Jesus lived. Reading scripture outdoors sheds a new light on many passages — so in September's Forest Church amidst the trees of the Church garden we read the story of Zacchaeus who climbed the Sycomore Fig tree (not a spelling mistake — the tree Zacchaeus chose was different from our UK sycamore) to see Jesus and ask ourselves why he did that.

Forest Church is an informal church, meeting (as much as possible!) outside and experiencing the natural environment. We greet one another, enjoy an activity in the outdoors, and there will always be a scripture passage and some prayers. One advantage that open doors church has is that we can spend time in quiet contemplation – and hear the birdsong and sound of our environment around us.

Forest Church is a bit different from our usual church environment as we travel light – we have some Bibles and activities are kept as simple as possible. For some of us, me included, getting outside of the building means turning to the prayers and scriptures memorised over the years.

Help would be much appreciated for Forest Church and I'm open to new ideas too!

You may say that there is no forest in Sale – true! – but the name of Sale (Sailh=willow) suggests we were once rich in woodlands. We are still blessed living here with trees and parkland.

So, to take the words of the Psalmist that we started off with, we can encounter God beside the still waters of Sale – the Bridgewater Canal and the Mersey. Come and join us on fourth Sunday of the month at 3 pm. In December, we won't be holding Forest Church as it would fall on Christmas Eve, so instead there will be Forest Church indoors under the boughs of the Christmas Tree Festival.

Reflected Faith Series: Remembering Our Loved Ones

For the last couple of months, we've been looking at seating in the church building.

Perhaps you've noticed that on the more 'special' items there are dedication plaques to the person who donated the money to buy the item or in whose name the item was purchased.

In some churches, pretty much everywhere you look you will find such labels, whilst in others they are much rarer.

Of course, many people donate financially and give specific items in their own name or in memory of someone else without wishing for this to be publicly noted. But often when folk donate something they do like it made clear.

A couple of centuries ago people would leave money after their death for a mass to be said for their soul. In some rich cases this would be every day for a year or even longer.

The 'very' rich paid for a new altar to be placed in the church building or even in an extension to the building – a chantry. This is where their personal mass would be conducted each day. In these cases, a stipend would also be paid to cover the cost of a separate priest to do this task, rather than the rector or vicar having it as an extra daily task.

A room would be provided for that priest above the chapel often.

This all stems from the belief that we

have sinned and will be punished in purgatory or hell but can 'buy' time off through prayers.

Today our theology has moved back to a more biblical understanding, that Christ is the one who bore our sins on the cross, and we can't earn our way to heaven; we can only get there by faith in Him.

But we still love and think about the people whom we loved, even though they are dead. Some Christians believe that, as we prayed for them in life, why should we stop just because they are dead?

As C.S.Lewis wrote;

"I pray because I can't help myself. I pray because I'm helpless. I pray because the need flows out of me all the time, waking and sleeping. It doesn't change God. It changes me."

A new kind of Remembrance poppy

For the first time in 28 years, there is a new kind of poppy for Remembrance Sunday this year: it is plastic free.

Director of the Poppy Appeal, Andy Taylor-Whyte explains: "We are very proud to introduce the plastic-free poppy. It will not only enable people to support our Armed Forces community but also continues the RBL's commitment to sustainability."

The new poppy has been three years in the development and making. The aim was to reduce the use of single-use plastic

and to "be economical, sustainable, and less impactful to the environment."

The new poppy design has a 40% smaller carbon footprint, and it made from "bespoke red and green paper." The paper comes from a blend of renewable fibres, 50 per cent of which has been recovered from the waste used in the production of coffee cups.

The plastic-free poppy will be available alongside remaining stocks of the current poppy, to reduce any waste of poppies already produced. Poppies containing single-use plastic can be returned to Sainsbury's stores for recycling.


Help us to respond, Lord,


