Summer is often a time of restoration and relaxation with time to explore our hobbies and interests helped by the increased light levels and access to outdoor spaces and it all starts on May 1st. May Day is the ancient festival celebrated the start of summer which is often celebrated with the crowning of a May Queen, dancing around a maypole or singing on the church roof. Married when she was still a child, Aline has experienced domestic violence, homelessness, and extreme

poverty. She was brought to a point where she says that 'people forgot I was human'. But Aline's love for her children, and her experience of God's love, filled her with exceptional courage. She was determined to give her children a better life and to help her neighbour. Aline joined a community workshop led by Christian Aid-funded trainers. She learnt about Village Savings and Loans Associations and was determined to form her own to help herself and others around her. With support from Christian Aid, Aline's and her children's lives have been lifted into the light. She works hard and is now able to afford to build a home and has purchased solar panels so her children have light so they can study even after the sun sets. In her family prayers she give thanks for the support they have received from Christian Aid and the differences it's made in their lives.

As we head into the summer months what will you be thankful for? The warmer days? The delights of a garden heading into the summer? A family wedding or a long-anticipated holiday? The conclusion of examinations and handing in of dissertations and course work?

I'm thankful for sabbatical time over the summer, as I engage in some academic research and undertaken visits and a trip overseas to meet up with former colleagues in the Diocese of Colombo, Sri Lanka.

I hope and pray that you will find restoration and relaxation time over the next few months.


May Bank Holidays
























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Reflecting Faith—The Church as a Building

Today's church buildings are rich and varied in their designs, sizes, materials, plans and groupings; from large cruciform churches to simple single room designs; from red brick to stone, and so on.

I wanted to look up some information about the fact that today's church buildings, although they may be 'modern', are usually built upon or very close to a previous church building. In other words, they stand quite literally in a long succession of church buildings.

However, on entering 'church building footprint' into the computer search engine, it responded in a related but unexpected, to me, way: 'The Energy Footprint Tool is a great way of monitoring your church building's carbon usage and energy efficiency.'

A very real issue for today's world! - and one we are very conscious about when we enter the building on a Sunday morning to find, even with the heating turned on for a number of hours, that it is considerably cooler than our own centrally heated homes.

Whilst it is theologically wonderful to have high ceilings, we can see how future remodelling might well lower the ceilings, bring in the walls, and shrink the glassed areas.

And so it has been through the ages - church buildings have constantly been amended.

When you look carefully at a church that is more than a few hundred years old, in any part of the world, you can trace the development of its use by its architecture. Perhaps you'll see a door or window bricked up or a new one opened. The widening of the nave by the addition of arches and one or more aisles. Change in stone or building materials as later technology was available or even a change in design as new techniques came into safe use.

Hello!

I thought I should introduce myself a little as I am going to be with you until Rev Becky returns from her sabbatical.

First, thank you for your welcome so far. I am very much looking forward to ministering with you in the coming days. Please note, I think of myself as ministering "with" you rather than "to" We are all in the business of vou. building the Kingdom of God together. My role is to serve you by leading worship and providing pastoral care as a priest. Our common task is to be disciples of our Lord Jesus and to spread his message of love and salvation amongst one another and our community. I hope that you believe your role is to pray and care as much for me as I will care for you. Of course, I am sure this extends to Revs Margaret and Lisa as well.

I thought you might like a little bit of background information. I am married to Lesley who I hope you will meet soon. She has two sons by her previous marriage and I have four children by mine. We have been married for about 16 years and live in Hollins Green.

From 1981 to 1998 I was a barrister in Liverpool. Then, until I retired in 2020 I was a judge in the Employment Tribunal, latterly in Manchester, and a part time judge in the Crown Courts and County Courts in the northwest.

By then I had been accepted for ordination training in the Diocese of Chester. I trained at Emmanuel Theological College. I was ordained as a Deacon in July 2022 and began my curacy at St Albans, Broadheath. I am currently training to be a spiritual director and pastoral supervisor.




I was ordained a priest in June last year. I was diagnosed with sarcoma in my lower leg 10 days later. I had surgery in September. I now use a wheelchair most of the time although I can walk a little bit using a prosthetic leg.

All this means I will have to lead services from a seated position. Please bear with me if that causes difficulty. I will work hard to engage as much as possible with parish life but I will need help accessing church and preparing for services.

I think you should also know that I have no hearing in my left ear and that makes conversation difficult when there is a lot of background noise. If you would like to speak to me about any matter in particular it probably would be a good idea for us to arrange a further time to do that. You can of course contact me by e-mail or phone if you prefer. I would generally be available, like Rev Becky, on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays but if we need to meet outside those times we could do so subject to my other commitments.

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



THY KINGDOM COME – 9th to 19th May 2024

This year more than a million Christians worldwide will be joining in long-distance prayer between Ascension Day to Pentecost $(9^{th} - 19^{th} \text{ May})$.

What started in 2016 with the Archbishops of Canterbury and York inviting the CofE to pray, has grown into an annual international and ecumenical call to 11 days of specific prayer that more people will come to know Jesus.

According to the organisers of Kingdom Come, the movement is now in nearly 90% of countries worldwide, and spread among 85 different denominations and traditions.

Kingdom Come explains that it encourages: "Every person, household and church to pray that those who have not yet heard the Good News of Jesus Christ and His love for the world, will hear it for themselves and respond and follow Him.

"Specifically, we again invite each Christian to pray that God's Spirit might work in the lives of 5 people whom they know, who have not responded with their 'Yes' to God's call."

Whether you have joined in 'Thy Kingdom Come' before or not, you are invited to take part this year. Archbishop Justin Welby says: "In praying 'Thy Kingdom Come' we all commit to playing our part in the renewal of the nations and the transformation of communities."

13th-20th May - Mental Health Awareness week

As this month we observe Mental Health Awareness Week, it would be well worth especially praying for our young people.

The Children's Commissioner for England has recently warned that our nation's children are still facing a mental health crisis, following the isolation and loneliness of the pandemic.

And now, Dame Rachel de Souza warns that too many of these children are being kept waiting "far too long" for professional support. She found that, of the 949,200 children and young people referred to Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) in 2022-23, more than 270,000 children and young people are still waiting to be seen.

Dame Rachel says: "This generation of children has experienced uniquely uncertain and challenging times. Some have spent some of their most formative years isolated and indoors, fearful they or their loved ones may catch a deadly virus.

"They have felt the squeeze of a cost-ofliving crisis, and they are keenly aware of the pressure their parents are under. They are constantly bombarded by negative news, of wars and climate catastrophe. And an increasing number are exposed to the harmful impact of social media, cyber bullying, and online exploitation."

She continued: "Against this backdrop, it is not surprising that we continue to see the number of children experiencing poor mental health at persistently high levels."

In the aftermath of our Annual Church Meetings, David Pickup, a solicitor, considers churchwardens...


Churchwardens have a vital and historical role in the life of the church. They are elected by the parish, not just the members of the church. Anyone in the parish can vote for them, not just people on the church's electoral roll.

So, if you want to be a churchwarden, just invite your neighbours on the day of the parish meetings in church!

Wardens used to have a significant role in the wider life of the parish with responsibilities for charity, poor relief and even bridges and roads.

Their church duties today include:

- Maintaining order and decency in the church and churchyard, especially during the time of divine service
- Being entrusted with the property of the church
- Having a duty to cooperate with the vicar
- Encouraging parishioners in practice of "true religion"



They may feel most of the time that they are weak and have fallen, but they are equipped with our support and prayers to look after other people who need strength or support - which is probably most of us at times!


