

# From the Vicar.....

Dear Friends,

We are just in the midst of concluding the Season of Creation, some may say a relative newcomer onto our liturgical calendar, but at this time of year when we're celebrating Harvest, maybe hosting an animal blessing service as part of our St Francis' day celebrations, joining in with Fairtrade Fortnight or simply observing the change in season from summer to autumn, then creation is very much part of lives and history. It is such an important topic to be discussing at the moment as we are seeing and feeling the impact of climate change on the world and unless we start to take this seriously then we will face severe consequences.

Just this weekend we have experienced a month's worth of rain in a matter of hours, causing roads and schools to close and wreaking transport chaos on commuters.

As I write there are 65 flood alerts across the country. Many factors contribute to flooding, but a warming atmosphere caused by climate change makes extreme rainfall more likely. The world has already warmed by about 1.2° since the industrial era began and temperatures will keep rising unless governments around the world make steep cuts to emissions.

In February 2020, General Synod voted for the whole of the Church of England to achieve Net Zero Carbon by 2030, recognising that the global climate emergency is a crisis for God's creation and a fundamental injustice. In November 2022 the Diocese of Chester adopted the same target. Last month they appointed a part-time Diocesan Environment Officer, the Revd Jill Elston who will be working closely with Net Zero Officer, Katy Purvis and the Buildings for Mission Officer,

Sheena Wilson as churches work towards the target of being net zero carbon.

The '5 Marks of Mission' which our church and other denominations also are committed to are:

- Proclaim the good news of the Kingdom
- Teach, baptise and nurture new believers
- Respond to human need by loving service
- Seek to transform unjust structures of society
- Safeguard the integrity of creation, sustaining and renewing the life of the earth

Here at St Paul's, we have just received our Bronze Eco-Church award and our new volunteer Eco-Church Champion, Vicky Moore will be enabling and encouraging us to work towards the Silver award as we get to grips with changes that

we need to implement across our buildings and within our worship and outreach.



Getting to zero carbon by 2030 may seem a huge task to undertake,

and it is, but it is possible by all of doing our bit. Those of us who purchase refreshments, assist with cleaning, lead worship and intercessions, help with church groups and church council members can all make small but sustainable changes.

We, as Christians, and indeed all people of faith and none, have a duty to care for our world, we are only here for a short time, but we have a great impact on it. We need to learn to tread lightly on this world, 'take nothing but photographs, leave nothing but footprints.'

I hope you are inspired by the 'Season of Creation' services to try and make difference to our world, not just for yourself but for future generations. The Diocese of Chester webpages on the links more environment have to information, including a Creation season calendar and Eco Church - An A Rocha UK Project. The Church of England also has lots of further resources and links - just google - 'Season of Creation | The Church of England'.

On 8<sup>th</sup> October, our Vicar Becky will be giving us an talk entitled Sri Lanka: Tea and Community Development after her recent visit to the country.



# Little Seeds Babes & Tots Update

Meets every Tuesday morning in termtime. We are still in a precarious position of needing additional volunteer support to assist with running the weekly babes and tots group, a big thank you to those who have stepped in at short notice to help. We know health issues are very much part of everyday life and the bigger the pool of volunteers, the more able we are to respond to last minute changes on rotas. We average between 20-30 families per session, so we are very much in demand. Parents and carers assist by helping during the session, but we really need folks to help set up, welcome as well as serve drinks, due to health and safety reasons we can't have parents and carers in the kitchen with little ones.

#### **Reflecting Faith: Window Glass**

I wrote recently about the Arts and Crafts Movement's influence in the decoration of churches in Britain. This is often evidenced in the designs of windows – but why do we have so much coloured glass of all shapes and sizes in church buildings?

Stained glass in churches is similar to wall paintings in that it adds colour as well as traditionally serving the purpose of teaching non-literate people the great events and characters of their religion.

But glass is so much more than that.

The techniques used to create these windows have been refined over the centuries, and their intricate beauty has inspired countless artists and designers.

The way the light shines through the glass creates a unique atmosphere that is often described as ethereal or heavenly. In this way, the use of stained-glass windows helps to create a sacred space that is set apart from the secular world.

The light shining through the glass is shown onto the brickwork or stonework surrounding the glass and depending on the original colours, the intensity of the light, the angle of the sun's rays as well as the height and angle away from the watcher: these can range from vibrantly strong to softly muted.


Hundreds of years ago people saw the changes in light in this way as being very significant. It was thought that the light

passing through was transformed or transmuted and because of this it had a healing and revivifying effect on people who placed themselves within its light.

# HYMN: The story behind ... Come Ye Thankful People Come

Come, ye thankful people, come, Raise the song of harvest home! All is safely gathered in, Ere the winter storms begin; God, our maker, doth provide For our wants to be supplied; Come to God's own temple, come; Raise the song of harvest home!

We ourselves are God's own field,
Fruit unto his praise to yield;
Wheat and tares together sown,
Unto joy or sorrow grown;
First the blade and then the ear;
Then the full corn shall appear:
Grant, O harvest Lord, that we
Wholesome grain and pure may be....


Very probably, you will sing this well-loved Harvest hymn this month. It was written by the Revd Henry Aldford, DD, a Victorian clergyman who had been a fellow student at Trinity College, Cambridge with Alfred Tennyson, and whose transparent goodness and friendliness seem to have made him liked and appreciated wherever he went.

His ministry began as vicar of Wymeswold, a tiny village in Leicestershire with a badly neglected church. Over 18 years, Henry rebuilt the faltering Christian community, faithfully visiting every person in his parish, and preaching his way through the Bible in sermons that were so clear that everyone

could understand him. He then moved on to the incumbency of Quebec Chapel in London for four years, before moving to the Deanery of Canterbury, in 1857, where he lived until his death in early 1871.

Henry was one of life's good people; gentle, kindly, grateful for everything he had (he used to say 'grace' before AND after each meal), and eager to encourage all those whom he served. He was prodigiously productive: writing something like 50 books. The best known of these was a four-volume exposition of the New Testament, which took him nearly 20 years.

His famous hymn draws upon two of Jesus' parables: the story of the wheat and tares (Mt 13:24-30) and also the story of the seed that grows unbeknown to the sower (Mark 4:26-29). Both are parables drawn from agriculture; both are about the ultimate harvest of our souls before God. During this lifetime we properly give thanks to God for our harvest of His gifts of creation, but we should also reflect on what seed we are sowing in our lives, and what harvest we may expect; as one day God will gather together *only His own* for the eternal heavenly harvest.




