

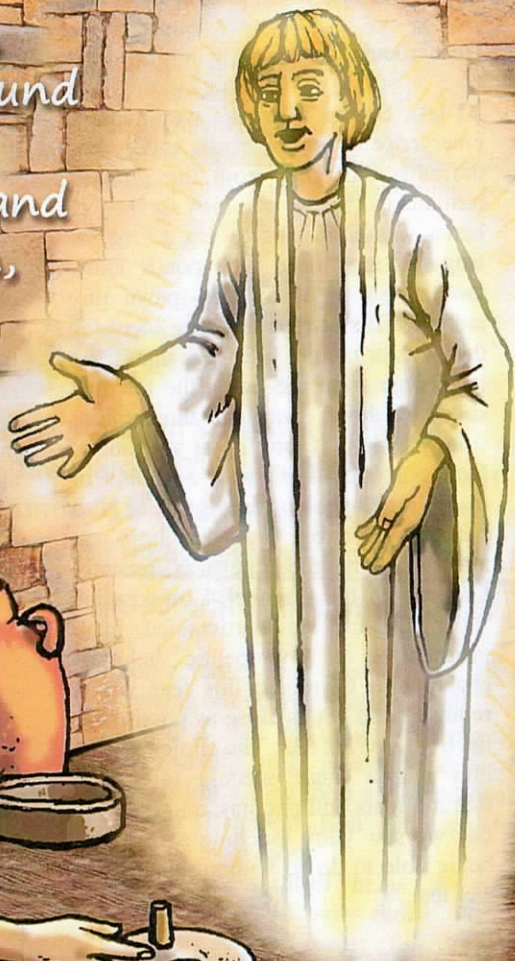

From the Vicar.....

Dear friends,

At last, Spring is on it's way and the emergence of purple crocus and yellow daffodils emerging from the grounds reminds us that we can look forward to better weather to come. It's a time for frog-spotting, those with ponds know the tell-tale signs of frog-spawn tiny tadpoles. It's always amazing to watch the transformation, little legs that begin to emerge from the body, the tail that suddenly drops away and the familiar froggy eyes that look up at you out of the water. For those with a phobia of frogs (ranidaphobia) this is not at all a pleasant sensation. Gardener Garry can attest to this, after he was recently featured on the Channel 4 programme 'Fear Clinic'. He participated in a programme of therapeutic help to enable him overcome this fear which required him get as close as possible to the object of his fear. The clinic treating him has a huge success rate with treating fears and phobias, and the next day we saw Gary touching a frog and being able to do so without apparently any fear.

Fear of course is very necessary to us, we teach children to fear – don't touch that it's hot - for example to keep them safe. Fear can arise from high emotions - feeling unsafe at a party full of balloons as a child for example led another participant to have a balloon phobia. Sadly, some churches can become places of fear too, quite often

unintentionally- however once someone has been hurt it is often too painful to come back to that place. People's fear of sharing is a significant problem within many church communities: the pervasive fear of judgment influences a resulting reluctance to be vulnerable. A fear of change can also be damaging in churches, where individual's heightened emotional states around and resistance to any kind of change causes a paralysis effect. Not wishing to upset individuals, nothing actually changes apart from the church dwindling on a downward spiral.

Shame and the fear of 'feeling not good enough' can silence us in environments where judgment dominates. These feelings are particularly damaging in surroundings where you expect acceptance and understanding, but encounter criticism or gossip. It's ironic because the church should be the safest place for us to share our struggles, yet for many, it feels like the last place they can be open. The fear of judgment is so intense that it prevents people from sharing their true selves, leading to isolation and a sense of not belonging. A quote I once read resonates deeply with this struggle: "Shame dies in safe spaces." To me, this means that if I have a story that fills me with shame, I can only begin to heal and find relief by sharing it in a space where I feel truly safe and supported.

But what happens when the very place that should be a place of refuge feels like a place of judgment? This culture of perfectionism is not just a problem; it's damaging. It creates an environment where people must hide their struggles, leading to a lack of genuine connection within the church. The very thing that should bring us closer—our shared humanity and the struggles that come with it—becomes the thing that drives us apart. So to counter this, we must create a church culture where vulnerability is accepted, valued, and supported. Our congregation comprises a diverse group of people, individuals with various issues, brokenness and on different spiritual journeys. As we enter this season of Lent, let's try and be accountable to one another, that we may put aside the temptation for criticism and gossip and look to be kinder and accepting of one another, that we learn not to fear change, but to embrace it,

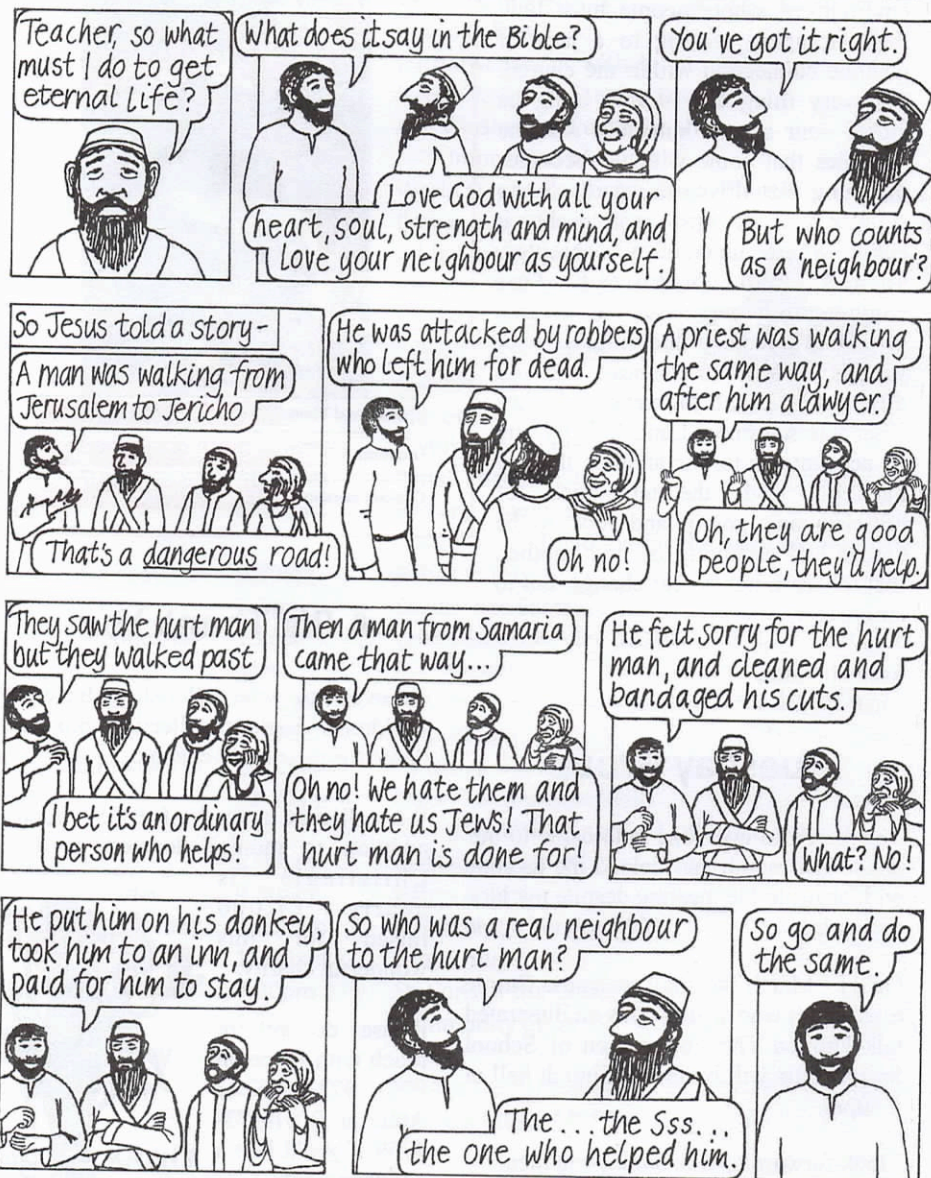
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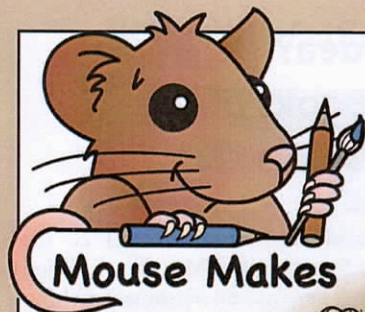

An Introduction to the Books of the Old Testament: Psalms

This month we continue our examination of a selection of books from the Old Testament.

'The Psalms have a unique place in the Bible, because most of the Scripture speaks to us, while the Psalms speak for us' (Athanasius of Alexandria).

The Book of Psalms contains 150 prayers or songs of praise, the majority (73) attributed to David, although some were composed later. They were mostly composed for liturgical worship. There are songs of praise, in which people joyfully express praise for God's work of creation and sustaining (eg 135 & 136). In others, the psalmist recounts a desperate situation and gives thanks for God's answer to his prayers (eg 30 & 116).

There are a significant number of psalms of lament, both individual (eg 3-7; 22) and communal (eg 44), which begin with a cry for help. Some express deliverance from sin (51 & 130), or point to the certainty that the Lord has heard their prayer (7, but contrast 88). The theme of trust is central in many psalms (23, 62 & 91).

The 'royal psalms' (eg 20, 21 & 72) point to the promised Messiah, fulfilled in Jesus. There are also psalms teaching wisdom (eg 37, 49); 'torah' psalms, focussing on the law of the Lord (eg 1, 19 & 119), and psalms which celebrate the history of Israel and God's faithfulness (eg 78, 105 & 106).

The psalms can help us in our own prayers, by providing us with models to follow, as they express our own deepest feelings as we approach God: *'The Lord is my shepherd, I shall lack nothing. He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters, he restores my soul'* (Psalm 23:1-3).

Bearing fruit takes time

Not easily when they are in blossom, but very easily when they bear fruit. Bearing fruit takes time and a lot of planting, preparation, nurture and growth.

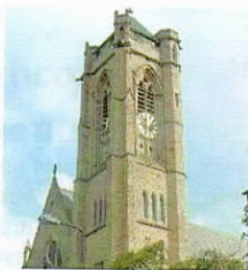
March is the time of year when gardeners begin to plant seeds ready for summer, but patience is needed – the seeds will take a while to germinate, and the gardener needs to write the names of seeds on labels and not forget which are fruit, flowers and vegetables. The seeds need to be in the dark, or the light, or the warmth or the cool, depending at what stage of life they are at.

So too, is God with us. God writes our names on His heart; God knows what fruit we can bring forth. God nurtures us and gives us light to grow. But first, we need to be planted and that can be scary.

Maybe you are feeling in a cold dark place this March, maybe it feels as if you've been buried, maybe you've got a weight above you and you can't see the way out. Just think that maybe you've been buried because you've been planted.

With patience there will be warmth and light, be like a seed, trust God, and begin to grow out of the darkness towards God's marvellous light. We won't see fruit immediately; we have to be nourished and mature and ripen. Patience will be given to us, fruit of the seed of the Holy Spirit.

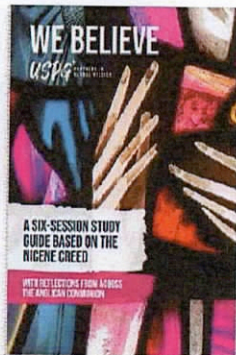

Stations of The Cross

The Stations of the Cross have formed part of Christian devotion for many centuries because they offer the individual the opportunity for prayer and reflection following in the footsteps of Jesus on the way to the Cross.

St Paul's has temporary stations just for Lent which are from a collection of paintings by the priest artist; Sieger Koder. 14 images known as Stations are put up around the inside of the church.

At each station we pause to hear bible verses, a reflection, prayer and sing a verse of a hymn before we move onto the next image.

The Stations of the Cross originated when early Christians visited Jerusalem and wanted to follow literally in the way

of Jesus, tracing the path from Pilate's house to Calvary and the garden tomb. They would pause for prayer and devotion at various points.

If you're not very mobile, you may sit down at any point. Please get in touch with clergy if you have any accessibility requirements.

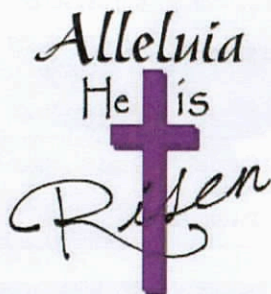

What the Electoral Roll is

The Electoral Roll is literally a register of people who can elect other people in the church. Being on the church Electoral Roll means that you can vote on any relevant issues at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) and stand for election to the PCC (the church council). Although the Electoral Roll is the closest thing the Church of England has to official membership, just signing up doesn't really make you a member of the church. It's more like you are already a 'member', by coming regularly to St Paul's and participating in the life of the church, and that would be your reason for being on the Electoral Roll.

How to apply to be on the Electoral Roll

To apply for the church Electoral Roll, you must:

- be 16 years old or over (although you can apply in the year you become 16 and you can be on the Electoral Roll once your birthday has passed)
- be baptised
- either live in the parish or have attended the church regularly for at least 6 months

Simply fill in the form and return it to one of the clergy or churchwarden.

Every 6 years

Every 6 years a new Roll must be prepared; this allows us to remove people who are now not attending the church and so have a more Up To Date Roll. Forms can be found at the back of church. The deadline is 20th April 2025.

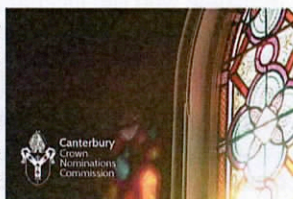

Rooted in rest: he gives sleep to his beloved...

Healthy plants need healthy roots. Roots give stability, they take up the nutrients that are needed for growth, and they seek out hydration for the desert times.

To be healthy as Christians, we need to be rooted—searching out those things that will sustain us for the long haul, going deep into those things that will give us stability. In this month's Encounter Day, Gill will be helping us to reflect on what it means to be rooted in rest.



Reflecting Faith: The Sacrament of Reconciliation

"All may, none must, some should."

(Summary of an Anglican approach to Confession & Reconciliation)

The practice of the sacrament of reconciliation is far from being scary, obscure or unusual, it is a normal part of Anglican worship, particularly at the Eucharist but also in the traditional Prayer Book services. In our Sunday services this begins with making a call to repentance. The congregation gathered says words of confession together, and the priest pronounces God's forgiveness while making the sign of the cross.

However alongside such corporate confession, there is also the Sacrament of Reconciliation or private confession, which is practised in the Anglican Church, especially in the Anglo-Catholic tradition. Many people observe a discipline of making their confession before major Feasts each year during Lent or Advent, or even more regularly through the year.

What is the Sacrament of Reconciliation about?

"The ministry of reconciliation is the ministry by which those who are truly sorry for their sins, and have made free confession of them to God in the presence of the minister, with intention to amend their lives, receive through him the forgiveness of God."

(The Revised Catechism of the Church of England)

Through confession we acknowledge our sins before God and receive the grace of forgiveness. Even through confessing our everyday faults the sacrament helps us form our

conscience, fight against evil tendencies, and let ourselves be healed by Christ, and progress in the life of the Spirit. Through receiving the gift of the Father's mercy, we're also encouraged to be merciful in our own lives. Acknowledging our faults, and those things which distance us from God is about letting go of those things which prevent us from being who we truly are. It's about becoming fully alive by embracing God's call to us to deepen our relationship with him. So, when we say sorry to God, we self-examine ourselves and honestly assess our life. And through that process, we accept God's invitation for conversion, for inner change. It's also about discovering anew our need of God and rediscovering our share in his life.

Here at St Paul's we ask you to book an appointment time with clergy, so that we can prepare and make sure the church is free and your confession can't be overheard by others. Clergy will pray with you and invite you to talk about what is on your conscience. They will listen and offer encouragement and advice. They may ask you to undertake a 'penance', a short act of devotion which could be saying a prayer or reading a passage of scripture. The priest will pronounce Absolution which declares God's mercy and forgiveness and give you a blessing before you leave. Whilst there is confidentiality within this setting, it must be noted that an exception may occur when the life or well-being of the penitent or another person is in potential danger.

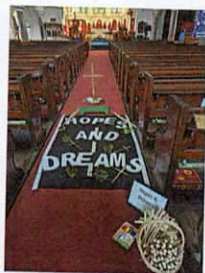
