# From the Vicar.....

Dear friends,

It's a later Easter this year, which means the school holidays come before Easter, always a challenge for those with school-age children as clergy and musicians who are contractually obliged to be at Holy Week services. I say this tongue-in-cheek, but even my family forget and ask the children what have you been up to in the Easter holidays and get the one-word reply 'church'. We have been fortunate that over the years we've been in church communities that have celebrated Holy Week in various ways. For example, the rural village church that ran a Palm Sunday messy church, with folks starting in church for the palm procession up the road to the hall for crafts, Godly-play activities and lamb burgers courtesy of the local farmer. There's also been the church on the housing estate that partnered with other churches for Good Friday procession of witness and dramatic re-enactment in the local shopping centre followed by hot-cross buns in the nearby Methodist church. Not forgetting either the lockdown Easter Sunday of 2020 including a pre-recorded online service, the church car-park and pavements were covered in rainbow-coloured writing wishing everyone a Happy Easter, 'Alleluia he has risen' and an Easter Egg hunt set up around the

gardens for any passersby to join in with. Toddlers on their balance bikes followed the newly chalked rainbow paths, weaving in and out of the words 'Love', 'Joy', 'Hope', 'Kindness' and knitted Easter chicks were taken off to new homes. Not quite the Easter Day that we thought we were having. It can be tricky to get that balance right too, children, grand-children that need entertaining, perhaps you've got care-responsibilities for older members of your family or indeed have health issues yourself. It may be that you're away for Holy Week, I know from experience that some churches struggle to put on services as their regular church members are away and other churches that get an unexpected boost to their numbers.

Wherever you are, whatever your circumstances please do take the opportunity to attend a service during Holy Week whether that's here at St Paul's, on-line or on your holidays. The beauty and significance of Holy Week are difficult to put into words, and many who attend church during this time find it to be a powerful opportunity for faith renewal. During our Maundy Thursday service, we will be offering foot-washing. If you've never experienced this before, don't worry—just make sure you're wearing socks. All feet are welcome!

I still remember the first time I was invited to have my feet washed—it truly made me feel the depth of Jesus' love for me. As recipients of the greatest gift of all—God's love—it is our duty to continue the journey toward the Kingdom of God. No matter our circumstances or resources, we are called to respond to God's Love in the same way the first disciples did when they discovered the empty tomb and encountered the resurrected Christ.







## **An Easter Book of Days – meeting the characters of the Cross and Resurrection By Gregory Cameron, Canterbury Press, £10.99**

Here are 25 characters from the stories of Lent, Holy Week and Easter - from the perspectives of scripture, history and legend. How can they enrich our practice of faith today?

As well as the familiar figures - Christ Himself, Mary His mother, Mary Magdalene, the disciples, Pilate, the soldiers, and the thieves crucified with Jesus, there is Veronica, wiping the face of Jesus as He carried his cross.

The author also explores the rich traditions that have built up around the cross and the crown of thorns, as well as tales of how the robin got its red breast, or what happened to the disciples after the Ascension. All in all, the book offers a richly textured guide to the Easter season.

## **17<sup>th</sup> April – What is Maundy Thursday?**

Maundy Thursday is the 5<sup>th</sup> day of Holy Week. 'Maundy' comes from the Latin word for command, 'mandare'. On this day the Church looks back to Jesus' command to His disciples that they should: "Love one another as I have loved you."

On the evening of Maundy Thursday Jesus shared the Last Supper with His disciples, before going on to the Garden of Gethsemane and being arrested. It was the last evening He had with them before His crucifixion.

## **Why do Christians wash feet on Maundy Thursday?**

At the Last Supper Jesus shocked His disciples by washing their feet. He did this as an example, to demonstrate to them that they should serve others with humility. Over the centuries, some churches have recreated this act of



## 20<sup>th</sup> April - Easter morning, the 'Other' Mary

As the traditional Easter story is rehearsed again this month, you may notice that there is one name that frequently occurs. It is that of the 'other' Mary – not the mother of Jesus, but Mary Magdalene, who stood by her at the cross and became the first person to actually meet the risen Christ.

That's quite a record for a woman who, the Gospels tell us, had been delivered by Jesus from 'seven devils' – New Testament language for some dark and horrible affliction of body, mind or spirit. As a result, her devotion to Him was total and her grief at His death overwhelming.

In church history Mary Magdalene became the 'fallen woman' a harlot who was rescued and forgiven by Jesus but there is no evidence to prove she was a 'fallen woman' but the contrast is sublime, Mary the virgin mother, the symbol of purity. Mary Magdalene, the scarlet woman who was saved and forgiven, the symbol of redemption. Surely, we all fall somewhere between those two extremes.



The dark cloud from which she was delivered may have been sexual, we are not told. What we do know is that the two Marys stood together at the cross, the Blessed Virgin and the woman rescued from who knows what darkness and despair.

The second great moment for her was as unexpected as it was momentous. She had gone with other women to the tomb of Jesus and found it empty. An angelic figure told them that Jesus was not there, He had risen – and the others drifted off. But Mary stayed, reluctant to leave it like that. She became aware of a man nearby, whom she took to be the gardener. She explained to him that the body of 'her Lord' had been taken away and she didn't know where to find Him.

The man simply said her name 'Mary' and she instantly realised it *was* Jesus. She made to hug Him, but He told her not to touch Him because His resurrection was not yet complete. She was, however, to go to the disciples and tell them she had met Him. She did – but they wouldn't believe her.

Her words – 'I have seen the Lord' – echo down the centuries, the very beating heart of the Christian gospel.


# Experience Easter with Springfield School

## Good Friday, Jesus and the thieves on the Cross

Luke's account of the crucifixion (Luke 23:32-43) emphasises the mocking of the crowd, *'If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself'* (35,37,39). In their view a Messiah does not hang on a cross and suffer. In considering the two men who were crucified with Jesus, we are also confronted with the issue of how Jesus secures salvation for us.

The other criminal's response in his last moments is a moving expression of faith. When challenging the other man, he spoke of the utter injustice of the crucifixion: *'this man has done nothing wrong.'* He perceived the truth that Jesus was indeed the Messiah. In a wonderful picture of grace, *'remember me when You come into Your kingdom'*, the second thief confessed his guilt and secured Jesus' forgiveness and mercy.



In reply, Jesus promised the man life from the moment of death; *'Today you will be with Me in paradise.'* Jesus used the picture of a walled garden to help the man understand His promise of protection and security in God's love and acceptance eternally.





The words of one of those crucified with Jesus reflected the crowd's taunts: *'Aren't you the Christ? Save yourself and us.'* He highlights the question of Jesus' identity: how can He save others, when He cannot save Himself from death? He failed to see that the cross itself was the means of salvation.

**So - what kind of Messiah was Jesus?**

Each one of us has to choose how we react to Jesus on the cross. Do we want Him to 'remember' us when He comes into His kingdom, or not?


If you were to die tonight, how confident would you be of going to be with Jesus? *'For Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God'* (1 Peter 3:18).

# "Some tough talking"



# 1<sup>st</sup> April - All Fools' Day

In years gone by, the rules surrounding April Fool were this: between midnight and noon on 1<sup>st</sup> April, everyone is 'fair game' to be made a fool of. It is the morning of the practical joke. But the aim is not just to discomfort the victim: he must be tricked into taking action himself, sent on a 'fool's errand'.



And so children would be sent to the dairy for a pint of dove's milk, or to the bookseller for *The Life of Eve's Mother*. Practical jokes on a bigger scale were played: in 1860 a vast number of people received an official looking invitation to the Tower of London that read: 'Admit the Bearer and Friends to view the Annual Ceremony of Washing the White Lions.' Precisely the same trick had been played in 1698.

Then, on the stroke of noon, tradition decrees, April Fools is finished. If anyone attempts devilry thereafter, even while the clock is still striking, it recoils on his own head. A child would then race through the sing-song formula: 'April-Fool-Day's-past-and-gone-you're-the-fool-and-I-am-none!'


Probably the most famous April Fool's joke of all time was the 1960's BBC TV broadcast feature on the spaghetti farms of Italy. A BBC reporter interviewed Italian farmers about their work and the progress of the spaghetti plants in great detail. Spaghetti plants were filmed being carefully planted, and then being harvested. And all in the BBC's most serious documentary manner. It took a while to appreciate that this was Auntie playing games. Whatever next!

The odd thing is that no one is quite sure of the origin of this very British tradition. Most attribute it to changes in Britain's calendar in the 1700s, when New Year's Day moved from 25<sup>th</sup> March to 1<sup>st</sup> January. Not surprisingly, the change caused a lot of confusion and mistakes around the start of April. Others look even further back, to the ancient Roman feast of Hilaria, when the goddess Cybele was celebrated with pranks and jokes around the Spring Equinox, 25<sup>th</sup> March.





*Hidden within the Passion story is a glorious illustration of Justification by Faith. The 'Penitent Thief' may or may not have been a thief, but up until his crucifixion he doesn't seem to have been a good guy, he is quoted as saying that he felt that his crucifixion was a 'just punishment' for his deeds. He must have done something pretty bad to have felt that way about one of the cruellest forms of execution ever devised by man's sick mind. But he recognised Jesus as his Lord and put his faith in Him, and Jesus responded by promising him paradise, despite the fact that this thief could do nothing in the way of good works in return!*
