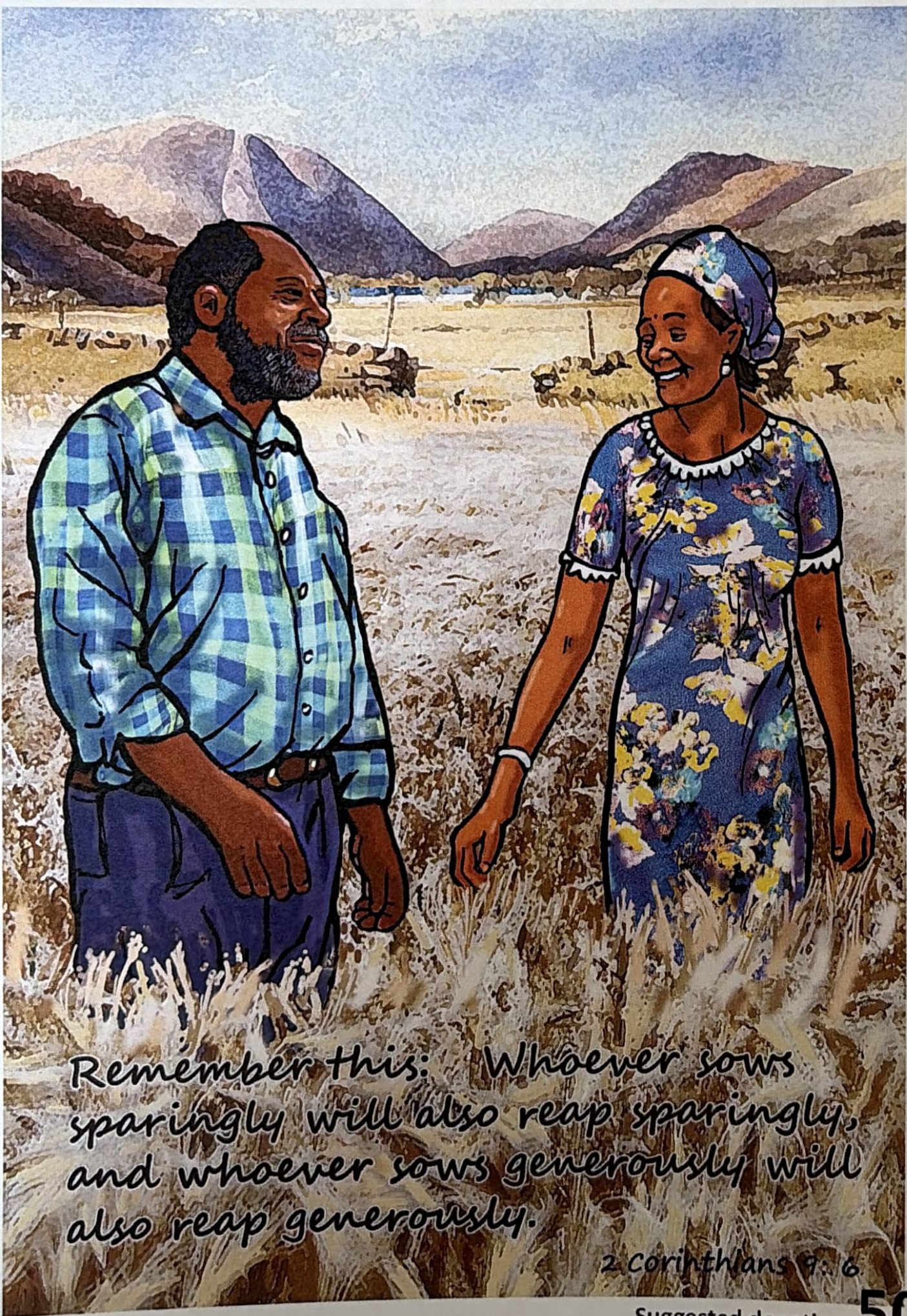

From the Vicar.....

Dear Friends,

September is often a month of new beginnings. The summer holidays draw to a close, schools and colleges begin a new academic year, and families settle once again into the rhythms of work, study and church life. For some, this brings excitement and anticipation; for others, particularly those facing a new school, a new class or a new chapter, it can bring uncertainty too. As a church family, we hold all these experiences before God and pray for our children, young people, teachers and families as they begin this new season.

Yet this September begins against a backdrop of profound sadness. The tragic loss of life at the Big Church Festival in West Sussex has shocked many within the Christian community. A gathering intended for worship, fellowship and celebration was suddenly marked by tragedy when a man lost his life and others were injured. Our thoughts and prayers are with his family and friends, with those who were injured, and with everyone who witnessed what happened.

We have also watched with sorrow too at the devastating loss of life following the catastrophic floods in Nepal following the collapse of a glacier. Communities have been torn apart, homes destroyed and families left grieving or waiting anxiously for news of loved ones. The scale of the disaster continues to unfold, reminding us of the vulnerability of human life and of our need for compassion, prayer and practical generosity.

Perhaps such events also cause us to reflect on our own experiences of grief and loss.

As most of you will be aware from the pew sheet notices, I have recently experienced the death of a parent and am grateful for support of family and loved ones as I grieve.

Each of us carries memories of people, opportunities, relationships or seasons of life that have ended. Grief can return unexpectedly, even when we think we have moved beyond it.

Faith does not require us to hide our sadness. The Bible gives us permission to lament, to bring our questions and tears before God, trusting that he meets us precisely where we are.

And so, as we enter September, let us remember that we do not journey alone. Paul reminds us to "encourage one another and build each other up" (1 Thessalonians 5:11).

That is part of what it means to be the church: to notice when someone is struggling, to offer a listening ear, to pray, to share burdens and to celebrate new beginnings together.

May this new season be one in which we grow closer to Christ and closer to one another. Whatever lies ahead, we can face it with hope, knowing that "the Lord is near to the broken-hearted" (Psalm 34:18), and that his love is stronger than grief and his light shines even in the darkest places.

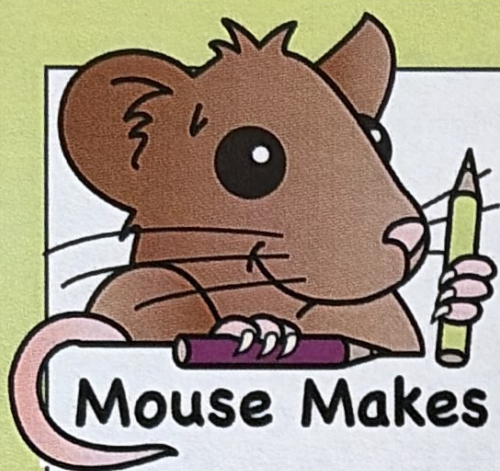

Back to School - facing that first Day

No matter how old we are, we can probably remember our first day at school – being left at the door, meeting children we did not know, separated from the adults we did know and had trusted since the day we were born. But on the other hand, there was the excitement: a big step along the road of life, new friends to make, another adult to become important in our lives. Yes, quite a lot to handle when you're rising five!

And that's what hundreds of thousands of children are going to experience this month. Parents may have prepared them for it, and they may in a slightly apprehensive way be looking forward to it, but it must feel to the five-year-old like a massive step into the unknown.

Not much less is the anxiety of mum, who leaves her precious child, proudly resplendent in their new school uniform, in the Reception class-room. Will he or she suddenly panic, and cry for that familiar parental cuddle? Will they feel abandoned in an alien setting? Will they like the teacher?

Of course we'll be praying for them, and we know that like millions of others before them they will very probably eventually decide that their schooldays were among the best of their lives. But end of class can't come soon enough for mum on that first day! How wonderful when they come running out, laughing and excited, clutching a piece of paper with some obscure crayon marks on it – written evidence of their first day's education.

A Tribute to Simon Chesters: A life of learning, faith and service 1967-2026



Hundreds of family members, friends, colleagues and church leaders recently gathered at St Mark's, Saltney, and online to give thanks for the life of Revd Canon Simon Chesters, whose

ministry touched countless lives across Chester Diocese and beyond.

After his ordination in Chester Cathedral in 1995, Simon served in parish ministry before holding several significant leadership roles. These included serving as Diocesan Ministry Development Officer and Director of Reader Training in Chester Diocese, Regional Development Adviser with the Church Pastoral Aid Society, Director of Studies and Director of Ordinands in Liverpool Diocese, and most recently Director of Ministry in Chester Diocese training ordinands, readers and OWL's.

The many stories shared during the service revealed a man who combined exceptional gifts with extraordinary kindness; someone whose wisdom, humour and faith left a lasting mark on all who knew him.

Due to the nature of Simon's sudden death and subsequent inquest, there was acknowledgement of the wide range of emotions felt by those gathered.

"We come in our rawness and do not need to tidy up our grief," she said. "Rather, we come honestly before God with the pain that we are carrying."

He'll ask how many people you welcomed into your home.

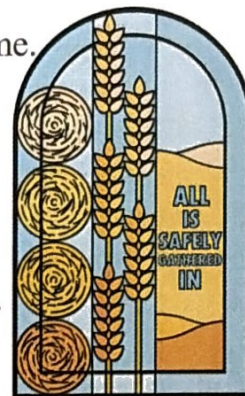
God won't ask about the clothes you had in your closet,

We are very pleased to welcome to our church family baby Barnaby who was baptised at St Paul's in August. Barnaby brought with him lots of family and friends who celebrated this special day.

If you're interested in baptism, we ask you to first of all to attend a service at St Paul's and make contact with clergy afterwards to begin the booking process.

In the Church of England we baptise both adults and infants. We have 1-1 sessions with clergy to help learn about what baptism means and how we can learn about our faith and what it means to be a follower of Jesus.

For those who have baptised as infants, it may be appropriate for you to think about being 'Confirmed'. This is a special service where you as an adult confirm the promises that were made on your behalf as an infant. Again we ask that you attend sessions with clergy who will help 'fill in any gaps' of knowledge and again assist with learning what it means to be a Christian in the 21st century.

Please contact clergy if you're interested in confirming your baptismal promises. Confirmation services are held throughout the year in churches across the Deanery.

Reflecting Faith: The Peace

Last time we reflected on the time of 'Intercessions' within our service. This month, we consider what comes next.

In a Common Worship Communion service, the 'Peace' comes straight after the Intercessions. There is no such thing with a Book of Common Prayer (BCP) service.

A time of sharing 'The Peace' is not restricted to Communion services, but may take place in other services also.

It does not have to follow the Intercessions, but instead could also be held towards the start or end of the service.

Where you place 'the Peace' is significant: having it at the beginning emphasises the community coming together, whilst towards the end of the service might be to emphasise the importance of being together that encourages and enables us to take God with us into our everyday lives.

But why have it at all? Haven't we all come together to this service to worship the same God? To be together with others who think and believe as we do?

Hopefully yes, but sometimes we just need a visible sign of that very unity and a reminder that we are a part of this community where we are, as well as a part of the wider church across the world.

It is so easy to forget this. To just go on repeat and not be conscious of this enormous honour that we have to 'meet together in His presence'.

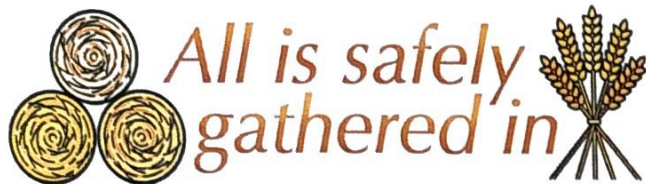
'Sharing the peace'- however we do that - with one another is a demonstrative act of community. Everyone is included.

New pilgrimage route for Conwy Valley

A new 22-mile pilgrimage route linking five churches in the Bro Celynnin Ministry Area has opened, as interest in walking spiritual paths continues to grow.

Llwybr Celynnin is a figure-of-eight trail that follows existing footpaths between Conwy and Llangelynnin, where it joins the North Wales Pilgrim's Way.

Walkers can collect a stamp at each church in a specially designed pilgrim passport, creating a record of their journey through the valley.

The route has been developed amid renewed interest in pilgrimage, including the BBC series Pilgrimage: The Road to Wild Wales, which followed seven celebrities along the North Wales Pilgrim's Way.

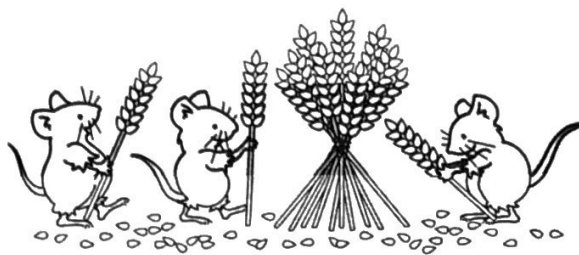
The route begins or ends at St Mary's Church in the centre of Conwy, which contains surviving parts of Aberconwy Abbey, a Cistercian monastery founded in the 12th Century.

It continues through the Conwy Valley to Llangelynnin Church, an ancient church overlooking the valley and already visited by walkers following the longer North Wales route.

Churches included in the route are St Mary's Conwy, St Mary's Caerhun, St Benedict's Gyffin, St Peter's Llanbedry-Cennin, and Llandelynnin Old Church above Henryd.

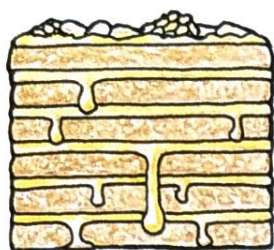
